For the athletes and their families, the games open doors to unimagined possibilities.


For those who volunteer, support, and sponsor, the games inspire unprecedented pride and hope for a brighter future.

The largest humanitarian event in the world, the World Games is, quite simply, the world at its best. Since 1968, Special Olympics has been leading a global movement for inclusion, using sport to provide people with intellectual disability (ID) greater recognition and for those with ID to live as valuable members and contributors to both sport and society.

Held every four years and with previous host cities such as Los Angeles, Dublin, Shanghai, Abu Dhabi and, in 2023, Berlin, Australia has the opportunity to, through a single catalytic event, become the most inclusive and accessible nation in the world. We can create systemic change with revolutionary social and economic impact, while removing unconscious bias from sport, education and everyday human connection.


Inclusion has a clear path forward.

Through the unique access pathway of Special Olympics, we want to make Australia the most inclusive nation on the planet. Australians have the desire to celebrate diversity in all its forms, and the World Games puts inclusion front of mind. We will educate, motivate, empower and activate.

The World Games puts participants at the heart of the World Games as we advocate for equality, care and dignity. With sport as a great unifier, we will mobilise for inclusion to be the new normal, to increase participation and competition and to improve health, education, economic and social outcomes for people with ID.

Approximately 3% of the world's population has ID. In Australia, there are more than 700,000 people with ID, including 208,000 children, making it the leading disability type.



72%

72% of Australians with a disability are not active enough for their age.

People with ID are three times more likely to be victims of violence, and have reduced opportunities to participate in the labour force or to study post-secondary education continuing a cycle of marginalisation.

85%

While 85% of people with ID are only mildly impaired, there is a misconception that they are incapable of participating in inclusive schools and inclusive sports.



A lasting legacy for all Australians

No other sporting event in the world has the capacity to dramatically shift society like the Special Olympics World Games.

Hosting the World Games brings a multitude of benefits, including direct and indirect economic impact and social impact that has the power to benefit all Australians, both today and for generations to come.

- Special Olympics supports UN Sustainable Development Goals targets in eight key areas.
- Each World Games leaves a lasting legacy including in Japan, where Special Olympics grew from 5 prefectures to all 47 prefectures, in Ireland which passed the Education for Persons with Disabilities Bill 2003 and the Disabilities Rights Bill 2003 and in the US where USD 100 million in federal support was committed to health and education regarding people with ID.
- Special Olympics Australia programs generate \$4.5 million in better health outcomes every year. During the 2027 World Games, 18,000+ health screenings will be delivered.
- 2013 South Korea World Games increased awareness of Special Olympics and understanding of intellectual disabilities from 2% to 72%.
- 2019 Abu Dhabi World Games delivered an economic impact of AED 771 million (local operational spend on the UAE economy).
